

CITY COUNCIL MEETING Minutes October 19, 2021

After the pledge and invocation by Amy Hurst, Mayor Stinson called the Meeting to order.

GUESTS

Sabrina Hazen- introduced herself as a mother of five children, a long-time resident of Falmouth and Pendleton County. She recently encountered some issues with the football program ran through Pendleton County Recreation relating to safety of the children and attempted to bring to the attention of the people in charge. She further stated there were differences of opinions with the adults, on how the Recreation Commission was being ran, but she did not feel her child should suffer. She said there was one person who is in a paid position, but also serves as Chairman to the Recreation Board, who solely made the decision to suspend her child not just from football, but from any Recreation activity. She is unable to get on an agenda to speak before the board. She stated she has been banned from attending the meetings where she wishes to address the Director and the Board to work towards a resolution. Her purpose for being at Council was to bring awareness to them as an agency who financially supports Pendleton County Recreation, to be more aware of the actions of a board being financed with tax-payer dollars. She felt it was not fair to be banned from a public meeting and not be able to speak. Luke Price spoke to Council that he was aware of the issues as he too had a child involved. He felt that as elected officials, they needed to be "look out" for the interest of everyone. He suggested to look into the situation and get both sides of the story, and at such time for renewal of the agreement, take a closer look. He stated that as parents, they could have and should have handled the situation differently and conducted themselves better so that the child did not suffer at the hands of adults. Ms. Hazen then stated she was reaching out to the entities of the agreement and trying to get the bylaws so that she has a better understanding than she currently has.

Betty Turner-She was present to address Council regarding Halloween being on a Sunday and Trick-or-Treat being scheduled then as well. She felt it needed to be moved to Saturday. She said there are churches having services during the 6-8 PM timeframe. There would be a lot of noise and a lot of kids running around, she was concerned for the safety of those kids which cannot be upheld by the City officials, police department or the Sherriff's department. She continued you will have people leaving church that wish to go home, they are not necessarily going to see those kids as they are leaving. If you are going to represent everyone, you have to represent fairly. She further stated she had multiple texts on her phone asking to let them know if the date can be changed to Saturday. She addressed Council that no one knew when this would be voted on and felt it unfair residents did not have a chance to have a

voice. It was explained to her the date and time had been set in August right after school started so they and other organizations could start the planning. The agendas for the regular meetings are added to the website on Friday before a meeting on Tuesday. There is no set agenda for the Caucus meetings. Luke Price stated he had spoken to several churches who planned to forego evening services so they might participate in the Trick-or-Treat and pass out candy. All those would have to change plans and may not get people to work their events as other plans had been previously made for Saturday. After a lengthy discussion for both sides of the issue a motion was made.

MOTION: Sebastian Ernst made a motion to change Trick-or-Treat to Saturday Oct 30, 6-8 PM. Luke Price second. Price-yes, Ernst-yes, Carson-no, Ammerman-yes, Owen-yes, and Hurst-yes. Vote: 5-1-0, motion passed.

OLD BUSINESS

Mayor Stinson gave an update on the visit with people from the Abigail Project who happened to be in Kentucky for a reunion at UK. All three are architects who were able to schedule a visit to the Klee farm and physically tour the land to see for themselves. Mayor Stinson said they "fell in love with the land," were very impressed, very complimentary of the potential, and excited for development. After the land tour, they convened at City Hall with Mayor Stinson, Joyce Carson, Amy Hurst, and Luke Price for a round-table discussion. Dr. Lenihan was also in attendance representing the dentist office and Total Care Pharmacy. The result of the round-table discussion is for them to revisit and start planning forums to invite the public and get feedback, input on what it is the community would like to see and what they feel is needed. Tentatively, they will try to return by the November 16th meeting. It was stressed that when they are ready, the public forum meetings would be well advertised.

NEW BUSINESS

Mayor Stinson reported a lease agreement had been reached with Dennis Gosney regarding his lot on Park Street in proximity to the old Ice House to be used for the leachate haulers. This location is ideal as

they can dump straight into the sewer. It would also allow for receiving more than we are currently take in hauling. The lease has an option for the city to be first option when the time comes for selling of lot.

COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY COUNTY OF PENDLETON CITY OF FALMOUTH ORDINANCE NO. 2021:8

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE PARKING REGULATIONS FOR THE CITY OF FALMOUTH

Whereas, the City of Falmouth is responsible for operation of its streets and sidewalks;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF FALMOUTH, COUNTY OF PENDLETON, COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY:

(Strikethrough portions are to be deleted, underlined portions are to be added as required by KRS 83A.060(3))

Section I

The City of Falmouth approves an amendment to the Code of Ordinances, Title VII: Traffic Code, Chapter 72 Parking Regulations, Section §54.022 Local Limits as follows:

§ 72.03 LIMITATIONS OF STOPPING AND PARKING.

It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to stop or park such vehicle except in a case of real emergency or in compliance with the provisions of this traffic code or when directed by a police officer or traffic sign or signal at any time in the following places:

- (A) On the mainly-traveled portion of any roadway or on any other place in the roadway where vehicles stand in any manner other than as specified in § 72.02.
 - (B) On a sidewalk.
 - (C) In front of sidewalk ramps provided for persons with disabilities.
 - (D) In front of a public or private driveway.
 - (E) Within an intersection or crosswalk.
- (F) At any place where official signs prohibit stopping or parking. This does not apply to police officers when operating properly identified vehicles during the performance of their official duties.
 - (G) Within 30 feet of any flashing beacon, traffic sign, or traffic-control device.
 - (H) On any controlled access highway.
 - (I) Within a highway tunnel.
 - (J) Within 15 feet of a fire hydrant.
 - (K) In an area between the roadways of a divided highway.
- (L) No person shall move a vehicle not lawfully under his control into any such prohibited area.

(M) It shall be unlawful to park a commercial vehicle, as defined by having a Gross Vehicle Weight if 26,001 lbs. or more on any City of Falmouth Street.

(KRS 189.450(5), (6)) Penalty, see § 72.99
